Mrs. Harrison Johnson was the luncheon guest of Mrs. C. C. Firth in Detroit on Tuesday.

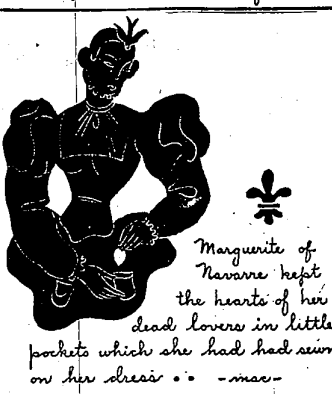
Mr. and Mrs. Hammond on Gill Road were Sunday guests of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hofmann.

CURRICULUM ANGLING

New Diphtheria Threat Brings State Warning

A total of thirteen new cases of diphtheria and four deaths from the disease in the first three weeks of January brought a warning to parents from the Michigan Department of Health.

Check up on your child's protection. Take your child to your physician or consult your local health department. The child's immunization program for diphtheria should begin at six months. He should have a booster shot at three years of age and another when he enters school. Your physician may recommend booster shots for older children if there is an outbreak of the community.

The majority of Michigan diphtheria cases and deaths occur in young children.

Fur Trapping Licenses Go Up As Prices Fall

The economic balance wheel has gone askew in the fur trapping field. In spite of fur prices dipping as much as 50 per cent under 1948 figures and averaging 20 per cent below the 1947 going rate, the conservation department is leasing trapping licenses in increasing numbers.

The department licensed nearly 3,000 trappers through December — an increase of 42 per cent over the 1947 corresponding figure. Fur buyers permit reflect a truer picture of the market. The department reported an eight per cent drop in the number of fur dealers licensed.

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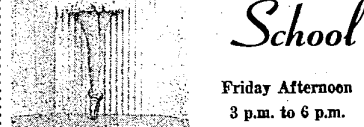
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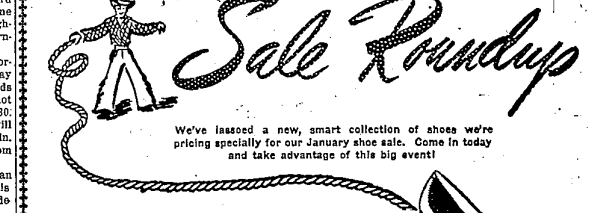
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
