RUST CONTROL IS GAINED BY KILLING BARBERY BUSHES
A 31-year battle to protect oats, barley, and rye from stem rust is being won by State and Federal workers on Michigan's Barbary Eradication Project, reports C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Michigan Department of Agriculture.

To eliminate stem-rust of grains the carrier of the disease, or rust-spreading barberry, must be destroyed. A total of 1416 square miles was surveyed.

During the last year project workers destroyed 3506 such barberry bushes on 231 rural and city properties. An additional 970 previously infected properties were inspected but no new growth was found. A total of 1416 square miles was surveyed.

To date, progress in Michigan has resulted in the destruction of 5,646,754 barberry bushes on 16,112 properties. Of these, only 41 per cent need to be surveyed. No further organized work is needed on 88 per cent of the land area of the state. The remaining 12 per cent will need surveying consists chiefly of the heavily infested barberry areas. Most of these square miles will require 2 or more surveys before the territory can be considered free of barberry. Consequently more years of painstaking effort lie ahead for the field workers who since 1918 have been combating the pest.

Barberry, a weed, has fence rows, orchards, woodlots, waste land and towns in their search for rust-spreading barberries.

Contrary to popular belief, Michigan is a very important area in the production of small fruits. Michigan ranks about tenth with respect to total production, but generally is in the first five when it comes to yield per acre. In 1948 a wheat crop of 56,770,000 bushels was produced from 1,395,000 acres.
