Each of the members is requested to bring a useful article for sale, since an auction of the items will be held after the business meeting. All members and friends of the class are invited.

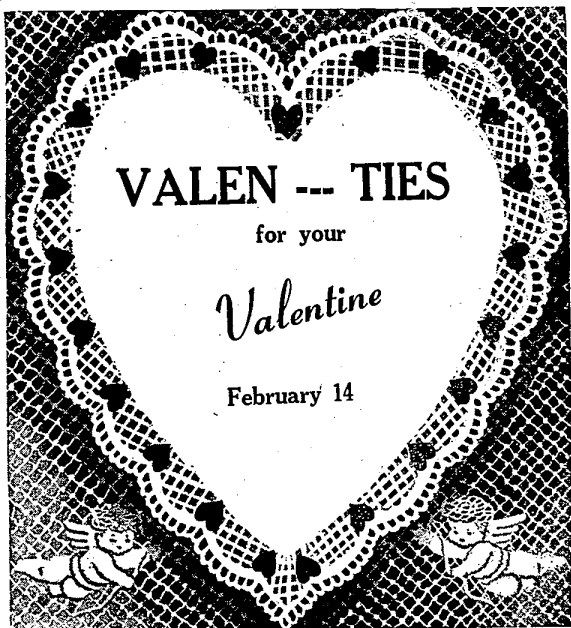
LOCAL MEN ATTEND LUMBER RETAILERS STATE-CONVENTION

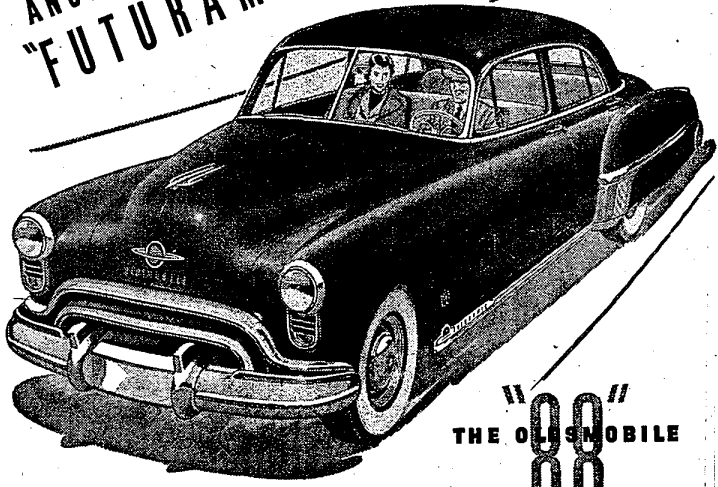
