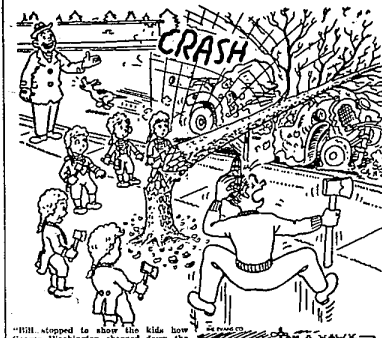

#### LEAGUE CLOSING

The end of the league is drawing near and the Rollways are still on top 33-21. The Hot Shots are second, the margin from five to three games behind the first place with 30-24.

The Hep Cats dropped from second and Hot Shots followed with two games and losing one, to put them one game behind the Hot Shots, 29-25. Four Fools held fourth position with 27-27.

Hotshots held fifth place, but the Alley Cats climbed up to tie them 21-33.

Alley Cats bowled the high for three games with 1377, while the Hep Cats and Hot Shots followed with 1346 and 1310 respectively. Alley Cats swamped the league by bowling the high for one game with 482. They also took second position with 478, followed by the Hot Shots and Rollways 462.

Dorothy Simon bowled the individual high for three games 399. Ruth Hamlin rolled 353 and Marge Mass 287.

Ruth Hamlin scored 149 high for one game, followed by Jo Brodie, 148, and Dorothy Siman, 136. D. S.

Rebounding from a four point whitewashing, the 777's took three points to regain second place in the Falcon League.

The luckless victims of the 777's wrath were Jack Clark's Gutterboys. Despite Gordon Rowe's high series of 462 pins the Gutterboys could take only the third game.

The 777's were led by Dick Wheeler, who bowled a 437 series. In the first game the 777's started well and swamped the Gutterboys by sixty pins. It was in this game that Rowe bowled his 171 game, but it was not enough to offset a 539 series by the 777's.

The Gutterboys started off with a bang in the second game. At one time they had a sixty pin lead, but the 777's staged a spectacular finish to win by three pins. In the last frame of the game, with a spare necessary for victory, Wheeler, however, was not worried about a little thing like that. He stepped up confidently and picked up the split to give his team a three pin victory.

Both teams bowled below average in the third game. The Gutterboys managed to eke out a 12 pin victory when the 777's went to pieces in the last frame.

On alters one and two Bill Gardner's league leading Pin Kings were given a rude surprise. The Kings figured to have an easy time with the last place Hot Shots but when the smoke of the battle cleared, each team had taken two points. The Pin Kings took the first and second games but lost total pins when the Hot Shots trounced them badly in the third game. Gardner was high for the Pin Kings with a 472 series, while Dick Beam paced the Hot Shots.

To complete a day of upsets, the "red hot" Foxy Flops were cooled off considerably by the fourth place Alley Cats. The Flops managed to take the first game before the roof fell on them. John Gatzler, Louis Hatch and Albert Zostek gave a great exhibition to take the second and third games along with total pins. With six more weeks of bowling remaining the three leading teams are bunched within four points of each other. The Pin Kings lead with 33 points, the 777's follow with 33 and the Foxy Flops are third with 32 points.

Next week's bowling pits the Hot Shots against the Gutterboys, the 777's against the Alley Cats, and the Foxy Flops versus the Pin Kings — so watch for fireworks. F. A. - F. M.

Miss Goers, a Farmington High School graduate, is attending the School of Business and Public Service. A. R.

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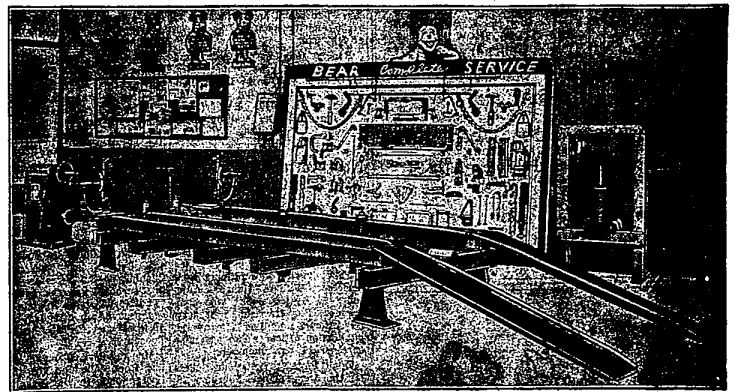
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
