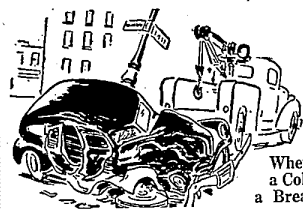

To the People of the Township:

As a candidate for re-election for the office of Farmington Township Supervisor, there are a few points that I would like to present.

1. In reference to the school taxes, — these were voted by the people of the school district, and the rates were allocated by the Oakland County Allocation Board, and ordered spread by affidavits of the four school district boards. There was no alternative.

The total tax spread for 1948 is County and School — there has been no township tax for the past two years. The tax rate in the Township Consolidated District is \$28.85 per thousand, assessed valuation. This is \$10.04 less than the city tax rate in the same school district. The difference in rate is due to the county equalization committee equalizing factor for the 1948 tax rolls. It has been my policy to keep valuations low, and justly and fairly equalized. If the Township needs more money for Township purposes, let the people vote it and raise the rate to acquire same.

2. In reference to the Township financial condition, it has \$50,000 in government bonds, and there is \$43,618.79 in the general fund. This money has been saved by the Township Board over a period of time against a future emergency.

3. As to roads and streets in the Township, the Township Board has spent approximately \$1,600 in the summer and fall of 1948. This has been done through the cooperation of the road commission. They furnished the gravel and a man to spread it, and the Township employed local men to truck it at \$1.00 per yard.

The Township Board has purchased 350 new steel posts and signs for all subdivisions and streets. The Road Commission is to designate where the posts are to be set and the Township will furnish the labor to set the posts. The signs and posts have been delivered, and work will start as soon as the weather permits.

4. We have purchased a new fire truck. In my judgment it is one that will prove very valuable. We are placing the truck now owned by the Township in the Clarenceville District. This should prove valuable to that section of the township and connect well with the water system there.

5. A police officer has been employed and a new car for his work is being purchased. This will be financed with funds that we receive from the Liquor Control Commission.

6. As your supervisor on the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, I am serving as chairman of the Drain Committee, also the miscellaneous committee, and am on a special committee which is making a study of cost and operation of county government. A report will be published about April 1, 1949.

7. In reference to American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, I have made a special effort to see that all veterans who were eligible got cancellations and exemptions of taxes, along with widows, indigents, welfare, infirmity, hospitalization, old age assistance, A.D.C. for dependent children and the blind. To all of these I have devoted much time and effort.

We are a rapidly growing township. The 1949 tax roll made a gain of \$600,000 in new property. As supervisor I wish to express my appreciation for the support that I have had from the Township Board, and to all who have shown such a fine spirit of cooperation.

I thank you for your loyal support in the past, and if you deem me worthy I solicit your support.

OAKLAND FARMERS CONSERVATION IS ASSISTED BY A.A.A.

Farmers of Oakland County can now sign their farm-plans to participate in the enlarged 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program, according to Walter Cook, chairman of the Oakland County AAA Committee.

The chairman advises farmers that an increase in funds has been authorized for the 1949 conservation program in Oakland County which will make possible an increase in the individual assistance payments to farmers and which should provide for a material increase in the overall conservation work carried out in this county during the year.

The Agricultural Conservation program is open to all farmers in the county who desire to participate. However, only certain approved conservation practices are eligible for financial assistance under the program. In Oakland County, the following practices have been approved for payments: Liming material; 1. Ground limestone, hard and hydraulic lime; 2. Fertilizer to be applied to spring seeded small grains that are seeded to alfalfa, clovers or perennial grasses. 4. Green manure crops to be plowed down in 1949 as sweet clover, June clover sown in 1948, winter rye or wheat. 5. Cover crops, fall sowing of spring grains. 6. Mulching materials, applied to orchards and vineyards. 7. Establishing soil waterways. 8. Field strip-cropping. 9. Complete pasture establishment, alfalfa and brome seedings made alone on land to be used for permanent pasture. Low ground seeded to reed canary grass. 10. Tree planting for reforestation, gully control and windbreaks. 11. Farm open ditched. 12. Tile drainage. 13. Establishing perennial cover in orchards.

Farmers may sign up for the 1949 program by filling out a farm plan on or before March 31, at the County AAA office or at their own township sign-up meeting, which will be announced later.

YOUTH TICKETED ON RECKLESS DRIVING CHARGE

Wynn H. Russell, 22, of 24285 Haggerty Road, was ticketed by the Farmington Police on a reckless driving charge after a collision of his car, driven by his son, with one owned by J. A. Mayrilles, 21214 Middlebelt Road. The accident occurred on Grand River, at 2:20 p.m. Saturday, February 12. The Russell vehicle rammed the Mayrilles vehicle, which was parked on the side of the road. Russell claimed that he fell asleep. Both cars were so badly damaged that both had to be removed by wreckers. No injuries were reported.

New Disease Hits Michigan Cattle

It has been recently determined by research workers of the School of Veterinary Medicine, Michigan State College, that anaplasmosis of cattle exists in Michigan, states Dr. C. F. Clark, State Veterinarian. This is the first authentic report of the occurrence of this disease in Michigan cattle.

Anaplasmosis is a blood disease of cattle only, infectious but not contagious, caused by a protozoan parasite. It is spread by blood-sucking ticks, mosquitoes, and any type of mass surgical procedure such as dehorning or castrating groups of animals.

This disease is not common at the present time, however, the presence of known carriers has been established. Sudden losses in cattle, those which become sick with loss of appetite, weakness, mental depression, or extreme paleness, should be referred to a local veterinarian for help. If anaplasmosis is suspected, he can confer with the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

To prevent the exposure of animals to this disease, thoroughly wash and disinfect any instrument or device which may transmit blood from one animal to another. Anaplasmosis is common in the southwestern, southern, and southern states. Many feeder calves are brought into Michigan from the southwestern states each year.

High Blood Pressure

Within the blood pressure remains continuously high, the heart enlarges. The heart muscle becomes thicker and stronger. This is the direct effect of the greater work required of the heart to maintain an adequate circulation. Your age, plus 100, is not a rule for proper blood pressure. Blood pressure should remain much the same throughout adult life.

Veterinarian Advises On Swine Diseases

Answers to questions about swine diseases were given this week by Dr. J. Kilham, extension veterinarian at Michigan State College. Swine enteritis is blamed for many losses in pork production, Dr. Kilham advises. It is not a single disease. It covers a dozen different infections and disorders. Veterinary diagnosis, herd survey

and study of feeding and management is usually necessary in order to check a suspected outbreak. To prevent losses, the veterinarian urges that farmers isolate newly-purchased swine for at least three weeks until they are known to be free of disease. Internal and external parasites should be controlled and watering and feeding equipment kept clean.

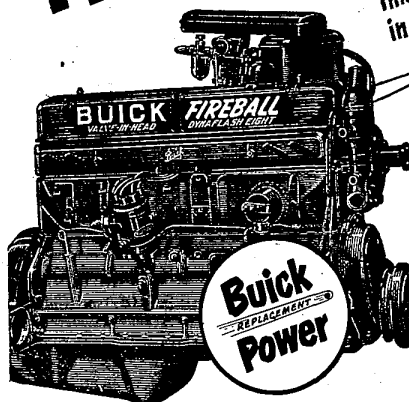
