Reburial services will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday, March 3, from the Farmington Methodist Church, for Lt. Don O. Coolman, 24, who was killed in Italy November 29, 1944.

Lt. Coolman was born in River Rouge, Michigan, July 23, 1921, and moved to Farmington with his parents when he was one year old. He graduated from Farmington High School in 1939. He was an apprentice tool and die maker at the Terensted Mfg. Company. He was a P-51 Mustang fighter pilot with the 15th Air Force Division at the time of his death.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. Coolman, four sisters, Mrs. Robert Schacht, Mrs. Gerald Roberts of Brighton, Michigan, Wanda and Ruthann; a brother, Homer, and his former wife, Mrs. Theresa Coolman Smith. An elder brother, Sgt. Dean Coolman, is deceased.

The remains of Lt. Coolman will lie in state at the residence of his parents, at 20418 Shadydale, until 11 a.m. Thursday.

Rev. A. Stanley Stone will officiate and military honors will be under the direction of Farmington Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4032.

Interment will be at North Farmington Cemetery.

MSC EXPERT GIVES FIVE FACTORS IN ORDERING CHICKS

For farmers who are still wondering if it is advisable to buy baby chicks this year, Howard Zindel, Michigan State College extension poultryman, has a few suggestions.

He says that the farmer should consider five points. If the answers are favorable, the chances are that poultry production would be profitable for the farmer. First, is the proper equipment available? Was there a poultry enterprise on the farm last year? Do you like poultry and chickens? Do you have time to manage and properly care for baby chicks? Last, Zindel advises that the farmer figure whether adequate feed is available.

The farmer who skips from the poultry business from one year to another has little chance of making money, he stresses. The "in and out" is invariably wrong — in or out at the wrong time.

Semi-Final State Tournament games will be played at two centers each in Lansing and East Lansing, Friday evening, March 18, as follows:

Class A games (2) — Jensen Fieldhouse floor, Michigan State College, East Lansing.
Class B games (2) — Sexton High School, Lansing.
Class C games (2) — Jensen Gymnasium floor, East Lansing.
Class D games (2) — Boys Vocational School, Lansing.

Games will begin at 7:30 and 9:00 p.m. respectively, at each center.

Championship State Tournament games will be played Saturday afternoon and evening, March 19, on the Jensen Fieldhouse floor, Michigan State College, East Lansing. The Class D and Class C games will be played at 2:00 and 3:00 p.m. respectively. The Class B and Class A games at 7:30 and 9:00 p.m. respectively. There will be 5,000 reserved and 5,000 unreserved seats for the afternoon session, and 11,500 reserved seats for the evening session. No general admission tickets will be sold for Saturday evening. Separate tickets will be necessary for admission to each session. General admission price is \$1.00; reserved seats are \$1.50, tax included.

The separate afternoon and evening sessions for the Championship games on Saturday, March 19, are an innovation this year. They break up the previous long four-game session and will allow commencing schools to purchase larger blocks of tickets for their followers.
