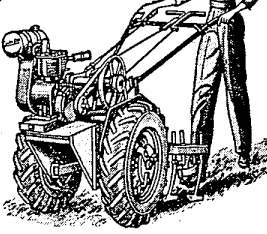

## Bowling News

Although the boys' bowling day has been changed from Thursday to Tuesday, the Pin Kings continue their policy of winning the big games.

As usual, the spectacular bowling of Bill Gardner was the big factor in the victory. Gardner bowled a high series of 537 pins, including two 193 games. John Buck and Jim Byrne tied for high honors among the Foogy Flops by bowling a 422 series each.

"This was one of the most crucial series of the year for both teams. As the bowling opened, the Pin Kings held first place with 39 points, while the Foogy Flops were in second place, one point behind. After the smoke of battle cleared, the Kings were still on top with 42 points; the Flops were down in third place, three points off the pace.

On alley one and two the hot and cold 77's got hot and swept all four points from the Alley Cats. Al Stocker finished his second game with six strikes in a row for a 206 game, but it failed to stop the rampaging 77's with a 186 high game each a 601 series. This important victory moved the 77's into second place, two points behind the Pin Kings. They will get an opportunity to make this up in next Tuesday's bowling when they battle the Pin Kings for first place. Since there are only three more weeks of bowling, this series may decide the winner in the Boys League.

When asked to comment on the forthcoming match, Captain Bill Gardner of the Pin Kings, said, "It's in the bag, we'll crush the 77's and take the championship in a blaze of glory."

On alleys three and four the Gutters batted the Hot Shots for possession of the league collar. The Gutters bowled four points as Joe Lapham bowled a 142 series, while Dick Bean paced the Hot Shots with 479 pins to his credit.

Besides the 77's Pin King battle, the Foogy Flops took the Gutters; the Hot Shots took on the Alleycats in next Tuesday's bowling. F. A. - F. M.
