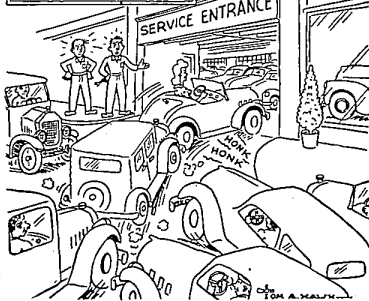

NEW YORK, N. Y. — Federal attorneys called for Grand Jury indictment against Judith Coplon, 27-year-old Justice Department employee, on charges of stealing government secrets. Valentine Gubitchev, a Russian engineer, was seized with her on a bus after being trailed from Washington by FBI agents. Miss Coplon, who is a former graduate of Barnard College, pleaded innocent. Gubitchev claimed diplomatic immunity. He is in a jail cell in lieu of \$100,000 bail. Miss Coplon's trial was set for April 1 and she was released on \$20,000 bail.

March 31 Is Deadline For 1949 AAA Plans

Oakland County farmers are reminded by Walter R. Cook, chairman of the Oakland County AAA Committee, that March 31 is the final date for signing farm plans for participation in the 1949 agricultural conservation program.

The program, which offers federal assistance payments to farmers who carry out approved soil conservation practices, is open to all farmers in Oakland County who sign farm plans prior to March 31 and who carry out the approved practices listed on their farm plans.

The funds allotted to Oakland County for the 1949 soil conservation payments total \$5,000,000 as compared to \$36,841,000 available last year for the 1948 program, which will make possible an increase in the individual assistance payments to farmers and will allow a greater volume of conservation work to be carried out this year.

Farmers who have not yet signed their ACP farm plans at township meetings, may do so any time between now and March 31 by calling at the County AAA office.

As of this week, the county chairman said that a total of 350 farmers in the county have signed up to participate in the 1949 ACP program.

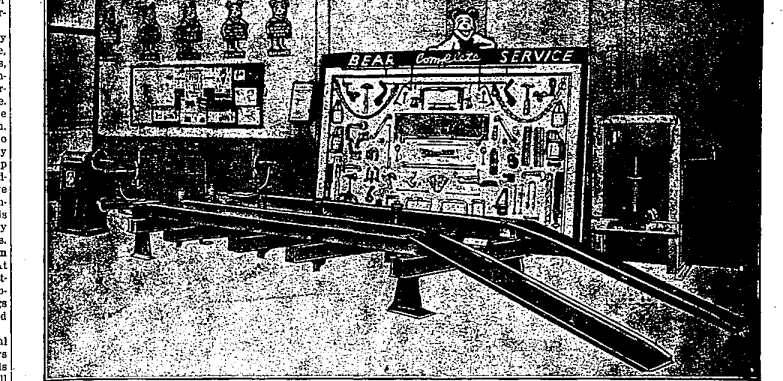
