STATE HEALTH DEPT. GIVEN SHAKE-UP IN ADMINISTRATION

Planned to give arguments both for and against state administrative reorganization, a pamphlet published by the cooperative extension service of Michigan State College is now available to Michigan residents.

For more than 30 years, Michigan people have heard of plans to streamline the state government, which has continued to grow. With this increased growth, due to demands for more services, has resulted a heavier tax bill. Many feel reorganization would bring about more efficient and economy in state government. While people want both efficiency and economy, many fear that through reorganization they may lose democratic control of the state administration.

Prepared by James W. Miller, assistant professor of history and political science, and Kenneth F. Miller, assistant professor of public administration, both of MSC, the pamphlet makes no recommendations.

It was published, the forward states, "to stimulate discussion on the subject in much the same manner as does 'Town Meeting of the Air.' It is our sincere belief that only by free and frequent discussion can we hope to promote and protect our democratic way of life."

The publication, Current Issues Pamphlet 3, titled "State Administrative Reorganization," is available without charge. County agricultural agents in each Michigan county can provide a copy or it may be obtained by writing the Bulletin Office, Department of Public Relations, Michigan State College, East Lansing, Michigan.

The appropriation as it would affect the Michigan conservation department would be based on 130 (fifty-four) 40 per cent in the ratio the state bears to the total of the U. S. area, and 60 per cent in the ratio that the number of paid fishing licenses bears to the total issued by all states.

Michigan was second in the number of fishing licenses issued during the last year, having sold 1,071,975.

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Uses of Paper

The Lowly Mushroom
