Farmers' Seed Testing  
Requires Ample Time

Farmers and seed dealers are re-  
quested to send in their samples  
of seeds for testing as soon as pos-  
sible of their expect to get their  
seed on the market for spring sale.

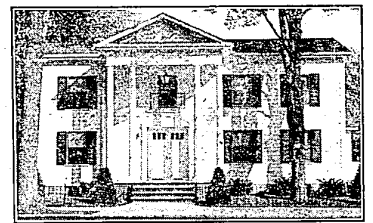
Samples should be forwarded to the  
Seed Division, Michigan Depart-  
ment of Agriculture, State Office  
Building, Lansing, Michigan, re-  
ports Charles A. Stahl, State Seed  
Analyst.

In spite of the fact that the Seed  
Division is very busy testing sam-  
ples at the present time, they will  
give prompt service to those need-  
ing immediate tests, but at least a  
week's time is required for the av-  
erage sample to germinate so tests  
can be made.

In forwarding samples of the

small seeds, such as clovers and  
alfalfas, two ounces, or approxi-  
mately a handful of seed, is the  
amount required for an accurate  
test. Too often samples are re-  
ceived for testing that are too  
small, then an additional sample  
must be requested.
