HAWKEYE SOYBEAN RANKS HIGHEST IN VARIETY TEST

Farmers who wish to grow soybeans can profit from the results of variety tests conducted in the corn belt in the past five years, says Karl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent.

Michigan was included in the tests, the agent relates. Top ranking variety was Hawkeye which outyielded all varieties of the same maturity. The Lincoln variety, which is one week later in maturity, outyielded the Hawkeye one bushel per acre. The Hawkeye, which is one week later than Early ana, outyielded it by three and one-half bushels per acre.

The Hawkeye stands as well as the Richmond and is much better in this respect than the Lincoln and Earlyana. Its lower pods are carried well off the ground which makes for easier handling.

Certified seed of the new Hawkeye soybean was increased in Michigan in 1948 to a point where many Michigan farmers will be able to obtain it. Agent Karl D. Feed Not Cause Of Chicken Ills

If you're blaming the feed of your chickens for ailments in the flock, the chances are that isn't where the fault lies, according to recent research reports received at Michigan State College.

Howard Zindel, MSC extension poultryman, says that tests by the U. S. Department of Agriculture have shown that when feeds are at fault, it is almost always a deficiency in the ration used, rather than harmful ingredients, that cause death or disease symptoms.

The report states that the first impulse of many poultrymen seems to be to take a sample of feed and have an analysis made when disease of unknown origin occurs. Much better diagnosis usually comes from examination of the chickens by a poultry pathologist than by feed analysis.

Certain undesirable conditions in the flock are sometimes caused by diet, it is pointed out. Feather picking and cannibalism are related to diet and management, especially to overcrowding and diets low in fiber and salt.
