

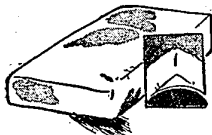

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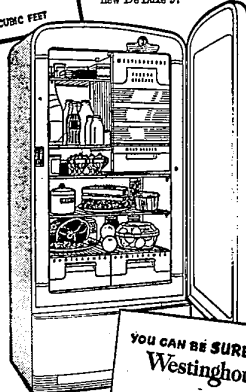

Springtime is safety-time! It is time to check your car to make sure it is in good running condition — and time, too, to take stock of yourself and your driving habits. Look out for the "hidden dangers" on the highways — the curves and hills that obscure your vision and demand slow, careful driving. Did you know that it is a traffic violation to pass another car on a hill or curve when you do not have a completely clear view ahead? You must stay on the right side of the highway when your view ahead is obscured. Failure to obey this traffic law may result in a head-on collision... it may result in death or permanent injury for yourself or a member of your family.
