**QUILL AND SCROLL SOCIETY**  
Most of the students in the Journalism class at Farmington High School are striving to gain honors. Quill and Scroll, the International Honor Society for High School Journalists. Although these students know the requirements of the Society, few other pupils do.

Quill and Scroll was organized on April 10, 1928, by a group of high school advisors for the purpose of encouraging and rewarding individual achievement in Journalism and associated fields. The Society has played an important part in raising standards in its field and in directing the course of high school Journalism.

A magazine is published by the Society and a year's subscription is awarded to new members upon initiation. Quill and Scroll is international in extent and not connected with any school or university. The president is an advisor elected by vote of the whole Society. The country is divided into seven districts, each of which is represented by at least one officer. Because chapters are so widely scattered, a national convention is not held; but chapters, if they desire, may meet in conjunction with state and sectional conventions.

Initiations may be made at any time during the year as students become eligible. Farmington may have two initiations.

There are many requirements for acceptance:  
The student must be at least in junior standing. He must be in the upper third of his class in general scholastic standing at the time of his election. He must have done superior work in some phase of journalistic endeavor. He must be recommended by the advisor or by the committee governing publications. He must be approved by the executive secretary.

In addition to meeting these qualifications, the student must also submit a sample of his best story when he is elected. He is judged on his selection according to journalistic standards.

The motto of the Society is taken from St. John, 8:32 "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

It is an honor to be a member of this society; therefore, the goal of most Journalism students is to be accepted. N. R.

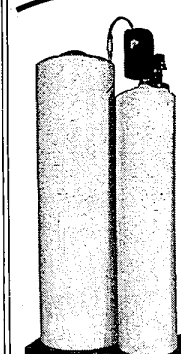
