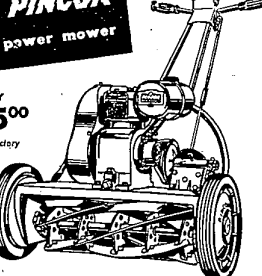

NEWS LETTER

With a possible May 20 adjournment of this session, the Speaker and Clerk advised the House that if we are to adjourn on that date, adoption of the adjournment resolution would be necessary on April 21. That means if the resolution is adopted, the House would then have seven days in which to report it out, pass all House bills that are to be passed, and get them to the Senate.

Following this 7-day deadline, we then have three days in which to report out Senate Bills to the floor. In effect this would mean any bills introduced after April 14th would in all probability not be considered, because they can not be printed in time to meet the requirements of being in the files of the members for 5 days before final passage, reported out and passed.

Consequently a mad rush ensued to get bills into the Clerk's hands by the deadline. Some of the odd bills covering a range of subject matter were introduced.

In memory of a great statesman and former governor, Hon. Chase S. Osborn, the Legislature met for an hour from its deliberations to hold memorial services in the House of Representatives. Our speaker, Victor A. Knox, Governor Williams and Mr. John Zabelko, editor of the newspaper at Sault Ste. Marie, participated in the memorial services, while Mrs. Joseph R. Gaud sang two hymns and closed the services with the singing of The Lord's Prayer.

A resolution was adopted expressing sorrow at the passing of the former governor, and providing for a joint legislative committee to attend the funeral in Sault Ste. Marie.

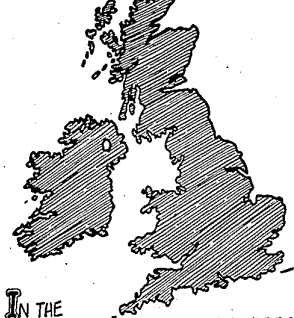
Several public hearings were held. The insecticide bill was discussed in one hearing before the Agriculture Committee. This measure has the backing of the Michigan Insecticide Fungicide Institute which includes manufacturers, contributors, and research and extension workers. The bill is directly in line with the resolution which the Michigan Farm Bureau delegates have adopted. Support for the bill was registered at the hearing by the State Agricultural Department, the State Chemist, the Farm Bureau, and representatives of various manufacturers of agricultural chemicals. The only opposition developing came from businessmen for out-of-state manufacturing interests who apparently would prefer a lenient law with very few teeth.

In another hearing the Unemployment Compensation Act was discussed. The CIO attacked the "disqualifications" provisions of the act as excessively restrictive. A Manufacturers Association spokesman called the proposed increased benefits "fantastic."

In other hearings before the State Affairs Committee, bills were discussed relative to a licensing board for homekeepers and tax consultants. There seems little sentiment for this type of legislation.

About 20 out of 200 women bar owners and members of the Barmaids Association, meeting with the House Liquor Committee, spoke on the repeal of section 19a of the Liquor Act. All appeals were more or less repulsed in that all favored repeal of this section, and all demanding equal rights with men to own and tend bars. It is their contention that everyone should have the right to work on the same job. They called attention to the fact that the suffrage act of many years ago gave them that right. Again and again they questioned the discrimination against women in cities of over 50,000 population, and wondered why it was more dangerous for women in larger cities to tend bar than it was for women in communities under the 50,000 population mark.

Several minor bills were passed, and many others advanced to Third Reading. The big surprise was

Job Outlook Bleak For College Grads

College graduates will need more assistance getting suitable jobs this year than for many years past, S. S. McLeod, Manager of the Branch Office of the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission, said this week.

Within the past few months, an extremely tight labor market, in which the bottom of the manpower barrel was often scraped, has been followed by a "soft" labor market, in which, in some areas of the state, one person out of every 10 who had a job last fall doesn't have it today, McLeod said.

The Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission, through its Employment Service Division, has devised a College Placement Program designed to render all possible job hunting aid to graduates and students leaving college in June.

Placement bureaus of some 43 colleges in Michigan, including the University of Detroit, have been asked to cooperate with the Commission in its annual project of finding the best possible job connection for their several graduates.

Despite the fact that many talented workers in all lines are available for employment at this time, it still remains true that industry often demands college education and the capacity for advancement and for assuming responsibility in its employees. Professionally trained men and women are always in demand, and it is an established fact that the worker with a college education has an advantage over plain John Doe, when both are looking for work.

Should no jobs be on file for the college applicant, the branch office makes an effort to develop a job in the community in which the
