Nor does it eliminate parent responsibility. It does, however, give boys and girls facilities that they could not otherwise have for organized activities.

This year is probably the most important in the history of the Recreation Commission. The newness of the program is worn off. Only by continual support and enthusiasm will this community betterment progrom grow and develop.
