Funeral services will be held May 3 for George D. Brykalski, killed September 3, 1943 in Northern France. Reburial will be made at Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery, St. Louis, Mo. Flight Officer Brykalski graduated from Farmington High School in 1941, and joined the armed forces prior to Pearl Harbor. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy Brykalski, a sister, Irene, and a brother, Thaddeus. Flowers can be sent to the funeral, care of the superintendent of the cemetery.

Farm Bureau Discussion Group Holds Meeting

The West Farmington Farm Bureau Discussion Group met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fraser Hults on April 14.

Twenty-five adults and four children were present. Two guest speakers, Martha Johnson, director of nursing from the Oakland County Health Bureau, and A. R. Musson, Oakland County Tuberculosis Association, spoke on the work their respective bureaus are doing.

The speakers stated Oakland County was the first in Michigan to have an organized health unit, begun in 1928.

Mr. Musson said the Mobile Unit would be in Farmington early in May to give free chest x-rays to all those wishing them. The exact date will be published in this paper.

The group decided to make a donation to the Cancer relief fund. The new Township Police Officer, William Edgar, was present at the meeting.

Dorothy Bush led the group in a game, in absence of the regular leader, Howard McCracken. June Green read an article from Reader's Digest entitled "Platform Performance". Naomi Howard led singing, with Mrs. Luketfahr at the piano.

The group will meet again May 12 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Palacki, with Mr. and Mrs. Fraser Hults and Mrs. Will Morris assisting with the refreshments.

Association PETITION FOR BETTER ROADS

The North Farmington Area Civic Association's campaign for better highways gained impetus this week with the filing of a petition seeking the improvement of Fourteen Mile Road.

The petition, signed by 175 residents of the vicinity, in both Farmington and West Bloomfield Townships, was presented to the Oakland County Board of Supervisors by George V. McLaughlin, association president.

The board accepted the petition and referred it to the committee on roads for early consideration.

The Association will press for improvement of other roads, Mr. McLaughlin said. He pointed out that Oakland County was obliged to maintain and improve highways which are used to a great extent by residents of neighboring communities, especially Wayne.

He said that he would explain his course of action at an early association meeting, which will be open to all interested residents. The date will be announced soon.

rubbing or other inconvenience. The purpose of the program is to find tuberculosis in its early stages so that it can be treated and cured easily and effectively.

Musson stated that every adult should take advantage of this free service if only for the assurance of knowing that he does not have tuberculosis and is not infecting his family. Each person X-rayed will fill out a simple form, carrying a few brief personal statements and also a self-addressed card. He will receive the card after the X-ray has been read. If any abnormality is found a detailed report is sent to the family physician designated by the person concerned. This does not necessarily mean that tuberculosis has been found, but it does indicate that some abnormality is present, and the physician can interpret the report.
