Saturdays — 8:30 o'clock a.m. to 12:00 noon.
2. The last day of registration will be Saturday, June 4, 1949, on which date, registration will be taken at the Board of Education Offices in the High School, continuously from 8:30 o'clock a.m. until 8:00 o'clock p.m.

To be eligible for registration, a person must be a citizen of the United States, over 21 years of age, a resident of the State for 6 months and of the School District 20 days prior to the date of the election.
