## COCONUT APRICOT BALLS

24 dried apricots 2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar  
1 can moist shredded coconut 2 tablespoons coconut flour  
Wash apricots and dry thoroughly. Put apricots and coconut through food chopper. Add orange juice and sugar and mix until blended. Shape into balls about 1/4 inch in diameter. Roll in shredded coconut. Makes 2 dozen balls.
