Youth groups can still make application for summer camping at a variety of good locations administered by the conservation department. However, starting June 1, the department also will accept requests from adult and out-of-state groups.

Choice dates are fewer with only one or two weeks of camping time still unassigned at only one group camp operated by the department's park division.

Smaller organized groups of 15 to 35 persons can reserve open dates at Bloomer camp in the Orconville recreation area north of Pontiac, Burns Lodge in the Waterloo recreation area west of Chelsea, and Hayes state park adjacent to the Irish Hills.

For organized groups of 50 to 100 persons, applications can be taken for camps at Ocqueoc lake, Rogers City, Island lake recreation area east of Brighton, Sleeper state park east of Cassville, Wilderness state park west of Mackinac City, and Ludington and Muskegon state parks.

Reservation requests should be mailed to the department's Lansing office.

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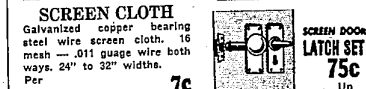
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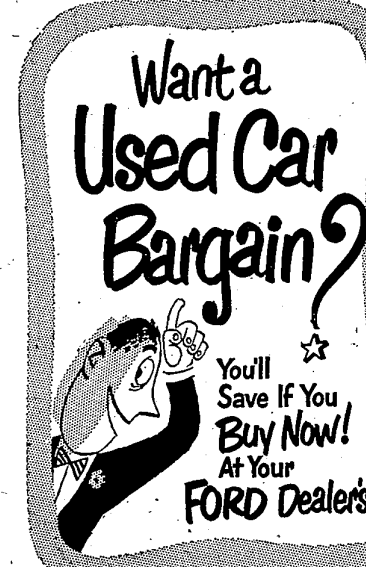
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
