If you'd like to put up a 415,000
home, go ahead. But don't be disappointed if someone builds a factory (or a pigsty) next door.
If all this sounds a little preposterous, better do what we did;
take a short tour of our township.
According to Dr. John R. Vos, all
the above is possible, and probable,
because the township has absolutely no zoning ordinance or building code. Anyone can build, dump,
or drain whatever or wherever he
or she wants to.
All this was craphically illustrat-

All this was graphically illustrated to a representative of the Farmington Enterprise Friday morning, as guest of Dr. Vos on a guided tour of Farmington Township. (Dr. Vos, it may be remembered, bitterly assalled the township board at the beginning of its recent meeting. He claimed the board had failed to assist and support his efforts to rectify unsanitary conditions.)

Covering a relatively small area, we saw many cases of promiscuous dumping, we saw chidren playing in rat and disease filled dumps, we saw well-maintained homes that have lost their yalue because of the shoddy construction of houses and factories going up nearby. We saw inexcusable, negligent filth. And we wondered how long it would be before an epidemic would attike, or before property values in the township, would sink to the vanishing point; how long it would be very constitution of the constitutio

be before the township citizens took action.
One of the first places on our tour was a small food shop. The proprietor, his wife, and several children live in a tipy hullding near-by. There is no running water: a chemical tolicit supplies need "nanitation". Here Dr. Vos. explained no licensing or inspection of food handlers is required, in, the township.

township.

Further on, we came to a large dump not ten feet from US Highway 16. Here a small stream was choked by an accumulation of trash. A child's tricycle stood in the middle of the stream valley. The cans and garbage littered the sides.

sides.

True, a small, very small "no dumping" sign was placed well on the side of the dump. But the sign didn't remove the filth; nor has it stopped the dumping.

Just as we were about to leave, a small child, probably 10 years old, walked down to the stream and dipped out a "can full of water. He told us he wanted to "put out" the fire" in a burning rubbish beap. On another side road, several "houses" were under construction, from bits and pleces of all materials. In the center of the haphazard building stood a new, spack-ling white, modern home. Dr. Vos estimated the value of the home in five years to be \$3500, it spresent value is \$3,000.
