Zoning Code Discussed

The proposed City Zoning Code was discussed at a public hearing Monday evening, May 8, at a meeting in the Farmington State Bank Building. Portions of the ordinance were read by Paul Schreiber, who assisted members of the City Commission in drawing it up. Under the code, the city is divided into several zones with rules laid down as to what types of houses, buildings and business places may be erected in each zone. Zones are: Residence A, Residence B, Suburban, Commercial A, Commercial B, Industrial, and Apartment.
