Covered Wagon Heralds Opening Of "Opportunity Bond" Campaign

Twenty-nine Michigan cities will play host to the historic "Covered Wagon", which begins its tour in Detroit as a symbol of the United States Treasury's Opportunity Bond Drive. "Be a Modern 'Forty-Niner'" is the theme of the campaign to sell \$4,500,000 worth of bonds to Michiganans, purchases which will bring four dollars for every three dollars spent, after ten years.

Lizabeth Scott, Hollywood star, is opening the drive in Detroit, and sending the covered wagon on its way.

It will cover Ferndale May 21; Birmingham and Pontiac May 23; Mt. Clemens May 24; Port Huron May 25; Flint May 26; Saginaw May 27; Bay City May 28; Midland and Mt. Pleasant May 30; Clare and Cadillac June 1; Traverse City June 2; Manistee and Ludington June 3; Muskegon June 4; Grand Rapids June 6; Ionia, June 7; Lansing and East Lansing June 7 and 8; Ann Arbor June 9; Adrian June 11; Jackson June 13; Battle Creek June 14; Kalamazoo June 15; Benton Harbor June 16; Dowagiac June 17; Niles, June 18.

Thirty covered wagons, all authentic relics of pioneer days, are leaving Independence, Missouri, some of many departures during 1849, homesteading days, and they will tour the entire country, covering 48 states. They are being flown by Army and Navy "airlift" from Independence to their first stops.

During this period, the Treasury Department will attempt to raise \$1,040,000,000 in Series "E" Savings Bonds. Purpose of the drive will be to distribute the national debt over a wide base. Through continued investment in these bonds, the debt is distributed as widely as possible, rather than concentrating it in banks. This secures a better balanced ownership and a less volatile debt. As the debt shifts from

of banks to persons, billions of dollars of interest go into American homes.

To possibly increase the amount of Savings Bonds outstanding and to point out to all Americans that their backlog of savings represents an important factor in their own country, the nation's economic stability is another reason for the campaign.

At present, forty-seven billions in Savings Bonds are now in the hands of the people. This is an all-time high, and represents almost one-fourth of the liquid assets of Americans.

The growth of payroll savings in the last year has made apparent several significant facts. That is, that the automatic plan is for most people the only sure way to save, and that money, for most Americans, must be saved before they get a chance to spend it.

The Likert survey of the security loan campaign showed that only one out of six bought bonds, but among people who have heard about bonds recently, one out of every five bought. Among people who were asked personally to buy bonds, one of every two purchased.
