

To combat internal parasites in livestock, Michigan State College extension specialists advise using clean pastures and practicing pasture rotation if possible. A clean pasture is one not grazed last year by the species of livestock that will occupy it this year.

Sugar beets are a crop that require good conditions. It is unwise to try to grow them profitably if the soil is not fertile or in poor physical structure.

Nails, glass, and other sharp objects should be removed so they cannot be swallowed by livestock.

The Sunday afternoon between 3 and 5 p.m. of the camp period they select. Camp will close each Saturday at 9 p.m.

The southern states, naturally enough, did not follow this trend. Yet they, too, desired a day on which to honor their Civil War dead. They were careful in choosing another date besides May 30. They also were careful not to use the same name. Virginia picked the name "Confederate Memorial Day" and most of the other southern states followed.

Mr. Moss said he was told that "if it hadn't been for that American aid, chances are ten to one that we would have been under the Iron Curtain by now."

He added that recovery in Europe is progressing well, but that the food situation in England is critical, more so even than during the war. "The only way they get along is just by tightening their belts and facing up to it," he said.

Mr. Moss has just completed an eight week tour of several European countries. He flew to Shannon airport, Ireland, and then toured Ireland, England, France, Belgium, Switzerland, Holland and Denmark.

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ONE CANCER TYPE COULD BE ENDED SAYS U. OF M. DOCTOR

This would be especially true in cases of cancer in the lower part of the uterus which can be studied only by X-ray, cutting out bits of tissue, and other more complicated methods.

Dr. Norman F. Miller, chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology in the University's Medical School, said early detection makes it possible to cure cervix cancer, a type of the disease occurring in the neck of the uterus. Thirty per cent of the cancers occurring in women are of this type, he declared.

"The lives of thousands of women are needlessly sacrificed with this disease could be saved by prompt and regular medical consultation," Dr. Miller said.

But the University doctor sounded a warning against undue optimism, both on the part of the doctor and patient, regarding the early detection of every type of cancer.
