

Conservationists Switch Will Start Forest Fire

Reversing their customary roles momentarily, Michigan conservation department fire fighters will start a fire — but will quickly extinguish it in a demonstration of latest fire fighting technique at the Railway Forest Fire Prevention Conference in Roscommon this week end.

The mobile fire-fighting apparatus, which will kindle and suppress a fire almost in one operation, will be demonstrated for officials of Michigan railroads, U. S. Forest Service, Wisconsin and Minnesota conservation departments, Michigan state highway department, Michigan Tourist Council and several fire companies in the three-day meeting at the Michigan conservation department's Higgins Lake training school.

Major topics of discussion will include the railroads' interest in forest fire prevention, presented by J. J. Danhof of the New York Central System; a railroad manager's view of the forest fire problem, by M. M. Cronk, of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad; the control problem in relation to the tourist and resort industry, by R. J. Farling, of the Michigan Tourist Council; and a newspaper's view of forest fire control.

Aerial Surveys Show Increase in Waterfowl

Aerial surveys of typical waterfowl breeding grounds in southern Michigan by Conservation department game men show some increase in nesting activity.

An appreciable increase in potential nesting waterfowl was noted in the Lake Erie marshes, a farm area, and practically the same breeding potential was observed in the lake areas of Ingham, Livingston and Oakland counties. By checking the sample grounds game men can get a comparative index in determining changes from year to year.

The results of the Michigan survey and similar surveys in other states and Canadian provinces will aid the U. S. Fish and Wildlife service in setting this year's waterfowl hunting seasons.

Whether Lloyd's of London would insure an individual fishing trip is a question, but the Michigan conservation department is not guaranteeing any lake or stream as "the best spot to go to get the easy ones".

Bounty payments on predatory animals jumped to \$5,180 in April according to the conservation department. March payments amounted to \$1,120, February, \$910. Of the 370 predators turned in, 335 were taken in the upper peninsula and included 306 coyotes, 19 bobcats and 10 wolves. State bounties were paid on 36 wolves taken in the northern half of the lower peninsula.

"God the Only Cause and Creator" will be the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Christian Science churches throughout the world on Sunday, June 5.

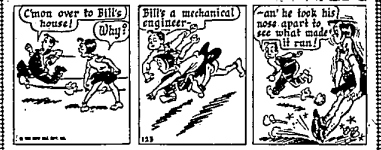

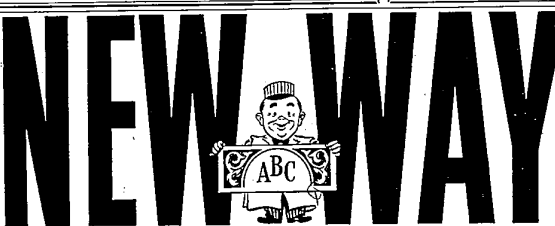
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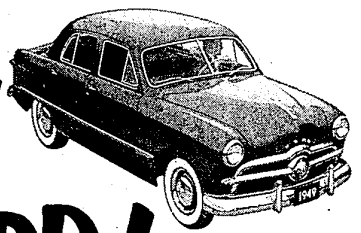
