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Cemetery Association Elected New Officers

Passing On Right Proves Disastrous

Mayo was proceeding down Grand River, allegedly passing cars on the right side. In the alleged process of passing a car on the right, he came off the side of Oldham's parked car.

Melvin F. Kirsch, of Detroit, forced Mayo to the curb when Mayo allegedly tried to pass once again on the right. Police officers were called and Mayo ticketed.

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Reports Short Weight Packages

Recent checking by food inspectors on weights in packages of potato chips has shown that the contents of some packages were below the weight declared on the package, reports Miles A. Nelson, Chief of the Bureau of Marketing and Enforcement, Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Inspectors weighed the contents of a large number of packages of different sizes and some packages were found to be short of the declared net weight. The largest shortage on containers checked was on a 1½ ounce package — found to be short up to ¼ ounce; some 10½ ounce packages were short as much as 2½ ounces, while a number of pound packages (16 ounces) were short up to 1½ ounces.

Checks have been made at distributing points for potato chips and in one location a supply that was checked involved a \$25,000 supply of potato chips. The sale of all chips from this distributor was stopped until all packages were reweighed and repackaged to comply with the law.

Mr. Nelson states that all short-weight supplies are being held, and arrangements are being made for repackaging such supplies. In some packages errors of this kind may amount to quite a few chips of potatoes to the purchaser.

Mrs. Roland Green and Mrs. Edith Knapp attended the Oakland County Farm Bureau Women's meeting at Clarkson Tuesday.

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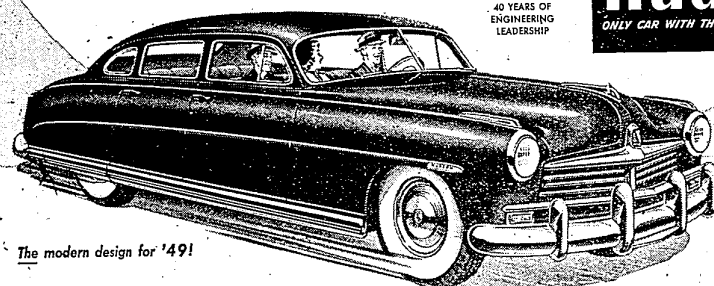
