**Announce Wheat Loan Rate**

The government farm price support program for the 1949 crop of wheat at a loan rate of \$2.03 per bushel, basis U. S. No. 1 wheat, will be available to Oakland County farmers this year, according to Walter R. Cook, chairman of the Oakland County AAA Committee.

The rate was established on the basis of 90 per cent of the parity price of wheat on July 1, 1949. The national average support rate for 1949 wheat is \$1.55 per bushel.

Price support protection will be made available to farmers by means of loans on farm-stored, or warehouse-stored wheat or by means of purchase agreements, Mr. Cook said. Farmers may apply for loans or sign purchase agreements anytime from harvest until January 31, 1950. The loans will mature on April 30, 1950, or earlier on demand, and bear interest at the rate of 3 per cent.

A storage payment of 7 cents per bushel will be paid to the farmer who stores his wheat on farm loan in the farm through April 30, 1950. Loans will be made on wheat produced in 1949 grading No. 3 or better, on No. 4 or 5 because of test weight or because it contains wheat of the classes durum and/or red durum.

Under the purchase agreement plan, the farmer receives a contract from the Commodity Credit Corporation that they will pay him the price support rate for his wheat after April 30, 1950, if he holds it until then because of inability to get the support price on the open market. The farmer is under no compulsion to hold his wheat until April 30, 1950, nor is he under any compulsion to sell his wheat then or at any other time to the government.

Under the loan program, wheat stored on the farm must be stored in acceptable storage structures approved by the county AAA committee, and, in the case of warehouse-stored wheat, must be stored in CCC-approved elevators.

The details of the program are practically the same as last year except that the closing date for eligibility is a month later this year than last. The necessary forms and full information concerning the wheat price support program can be obtained at the county AAA office.
