

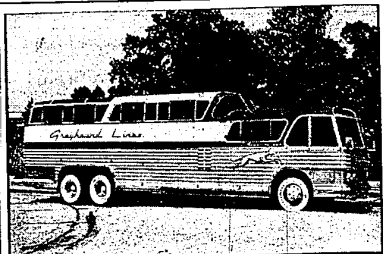
**Baby Girl Born July 17 To The W. D. Ecklers**

Lora Snover, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Snover of 13 Mile Road, underwent an operation at Mount Carmel Hospital last week.

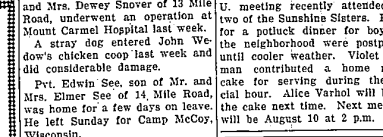
A stray dog entered John W. Dow's chicken coop last week and did considerable damage.
