20 per cent less than COST rent in private housing.

How much is all this going to cost the federal taxpayer?

Quoting Foley: "The maximum possible total, with \$10,000 units, comes to around \$120,000,000 (12 BILLION DOLLARS)." The rent subsidies are estimated by Foley to come to around 7 BILLION dollars, spread over 30 to 40 years.

Who pays the cost of running the local housing authority? The administrative overhead is covered by money obtained from bonds and rentals.

How much can Michigan get out of the federal housing aid? Not more than 10 per cent may go into any one state.

Farm housing benefits are also available. In fact, submarginal farms (those which are not self-supporting) may obtain an outright gift from the Great White Father. A fourth of a billion dollars has been set aside for housing loans to farmers who cannot get private loans.

In 1929 the Federal government spent \$1.3 billion on goods and services; \$3.2 billion in 1939; \$21 billion in 1948, and an estimated \$28 billion in 1949. The 1950 spending will be close to \$30 billion with a treasury cash deficit of \$5 to \$8 billion.

Well, there it is: The public housing program in a nutshell. If your community is interested, officials may write the governor's office at Lansing for details.

Racing Costs Two \$120 In Fines

Judge John J. Schulte Thursday gave evidence of the fate awaiting speedsters.
Wesley Allen Priebe, 17, of Royal Oak, and Clarence O. Conkey, 21, of Highland Park, were brought before him Thursday afternoon. They faced charges of reckless driving, running red lights, and excessive speeding. According to State Police, Priebe and Conkey had been apprehended July 25 racing on Northwestern Highway.

Both were fined \$50, plus costs of \$10, or offered 45 days in the Oakland County jail. They chose the fines. In addition, the judge is recommending that the Secretary of State revoke Priebe's driver's license — he has been ticketed twice previously, once for speeding and another time for running a stop sign.

Priebe's mother, present at the proceedings, was not satisfied with the judgment rendered. She claimed fines were not just punishment for the youthful delinquents, because their parents had to pay the fines. The judge countered that the fines did not have to be paid; the alternate, 45 days in jail, was available.

Thereupon, the woman expressed surprise at the heavy fine, stating she "didn't think it would be more than \$25."
According to State Police, 50% of all highway fatalities are caused by drivers in the 17-22 age group.

NEW YORK POLITICS
Former Gov. Herbert Lehmann and New York Boss Ed Flynn have been playing cat-and-mouse over who will run for Bob Wagner's senate seat.

They held two secret huddles, during which Flynn tried to get Lehman to announce his candidacy for the senate immediately. Flynn didn't say so but, if Lehman announced right away, the way would be clear for Flynn's friend, Brooklyn Borough President John Cashmore, to be Democratic candidate for mayor of the city's largest city.

Lehman, however, knows he'll have a tough fight to win the senate seat in November, so he wants a strong candidate on the ticket with him for mayor — and not John Cashmore. That is why he refused to announce until assured who his running mate will be.

NEWS CAPSULES
Senate office scramble — John Foster Dulles' arrival in the senate has started a scramble for offices. Twenty-five senators are planning to trade offices — just to make room for the new senator from New York. What happened is that under the seniority system, Dulles lost out on the totem pole and not entitled to the choice office vacated by Senator Wagner.

Next in line is Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming.

Recruit training is the sharp break between civilian and Naval life in which the new Navy man learns the fundamental principles of the Naval service.
In the course of his training, the recruit is taught seamanship, Navy customs, terms, basic ordnance, gunnery, signaling and navigation. Upon completion of his training the recruit is assigned either to units of the Fleet or to a service school for specialized training.
