

Twentieth Century Man To Rediscover Mississippi

Louis Jolliet, Canadian born explorer - fur trader, and Father Jacques Marquette, Jesuit missionary, set out from St. Ignace, Michigan in 1673 to explore the great river to the west called Mississippi.



With them went five French voyageurs, the seven traveling in two birch bark canoes. Their expedition was the first to penetrate the heartland of the new country that was to become the United States 100 years later, according to the Michigan Tourist Council.

On the 300th anniversary of this historic voyage, May 17, 1973, seven 20th century voyageurs will embark from St. Ignace to retrace the route of Jolliet and Father Marquette. The course of their four-month journey will be historically accurate and

authenticity will govern other aspects of the trip.

The men will wear hand made costumes fashioned after those worn by their 17th century counterparts. A Jesuit priest will make the journey as Father Marquette. All seven men are learning French and the rhythmic songs of the early yovagurs.

The 20-foot canoes, however, will be constructed of a toned fiberglass with white cedar-ribs, that photographs like birchbark.

The route of the 1973 voyage of discovery will cover 2,500 miles, as mapped by Jolliet. From St. Ignace, the canoeists will follow the north shore of Lake Michigan to Point Detour, from there, they will island hop to Green Bay, Wisconsin make their way up the Fox River, portage to the Wisconsin River then south to the Mississippi continuing south on the Arkansas.

On the return trip, they will take a short cut to Lake Michigan (as did Jolliet and Marquette), following the Illinois River, from a point near Alton, to Chicago then northward to Green Bay.

Cities and towns along the route are planning events and celebrations around the explorers' schedule. The Michigan Tourist Council, the Chamber of Commerce and City of St. Ignace, the Father Marquette Historical Productions Association and the Upper Peninsula Travel and Recreation Association are formulating plans for a gala bon voyage for the voyage.

Electronic Devices Aid Fisherman In His Quest


Fishing has come a long way since the old bamboo pole and cork bobber.

Today's fisherman is equipped with modern, fish-catching devices far beyond Grandpa's boyhood dreams. We're in the "Age of the Electronic Angler."

Today's electronic angler switches on his electric, silent, non-polluting trolling motor and heads onto his favorite water. The fisherman scans the dial on his electronic fish-finder that reads the depth and contour of the lake bottom, checking the likeliest fishing spot. And he may even use his battery-powered water temperature gauge -- after he uses his plastic transmitter that sends fish-attracting sound waves through the water.

The secret of their wide acceptance and popularity of electronic fish-finders is simple -- they work. The better models certainly cannot be classified as toys or gadgets, but rather as precision instruments that guide the fisherman to where the fish should be.

For some the new electronic aids add more fun to fishing because they



allow the angler -- both amateur or expert -- to catch more fish.

However, catching fish is still up to the fisherman. The modern devices only show where the fish are likely to bot; they don't put them on the hook for you.
