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## Man Injured By Mowing Machine

Robert Schmid, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Schmid of Halsted Road, was seriously injured Sunday afternoon when a mowing machine operated by his father caught the young man's leg.

Three hours of surgery at Redford Receiving Hospital were needed to close the wound. Reports on Tuesday indicated the man to be in "good" condition after being listed as "serious."

The accident occurred when the two men were cutting weeds in the family orchard on Halsted Road. About to start repairs on the machine, the younger Schmid started off to get a wrench and slipped. His father was unable to shut off the machine in time to prevent the injury.

The man's right leg was severely cut above the ankle, and a small bone fractured. He was rushed to Redford Receiving Hospital, and later moved to Mt. Carmel, where he was put under the care of specialists.

## How To Get Aid From National Foundation If Polio Strikes

1. At the first sign of illness, call your own doctor. If he suspects polio he will report the case to the local Health Department and arrange for hospitalization or home care, as indicated. The National Foundation does not select physicians or hospitals. This is a family matter. If you have no family physician, call your City or County Medical Society, your Board of Health or the nearest doctor.

2. If your doctor says it is polio and requires hospitalization, the local chapter of the National Foundation will help arrange for transportation to a treatment center. As soon as the patient goes to the hospital - or if your doctor advises the patient can be treated at home - get in touch with your chapter of the National Foundation to arrange for any needed assistance.

3. Most chapters are listed in the telephone book under N for National Foundation, 1 for Infantile Paralysis and the letter starting the name of the county you live in. In Washington County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. If you can't find it, check with your doctor, hospital or Health Department.

4. Your chapter will get in touch with you as soon as it learns of the case through your physician, the hospital or the Health Department. However, late reporting or a heavy hospital load may delay this chapter contact. If you do not hear promptly, telephone or visit the chapter representative. You can ease your own worries sooner by making the approach yourself.

5. The chapter representative will notify the hospital that it is arranging with you for full or partial payment of expenses for medical care. Adults are as eligible for help as are children. Discuss with your chapter how much of the full bill the chapter will pay.

6. March of Dimes funds are used to help the medically indigent - but this is not the same as indigent. It includes families of moderate income, who cannot meet the high cost of modern care of this expensive disease. The help is a gift - not a loan. Family families that can pay are expected to do so, no family is expected to impoverish itself to meet medical expenses for polio.

7. Even if you can assume full costs for initial hospitalization, it is a good idea to see your chapter. If yours should be a patient who is severely affected - and this cannot be determined in the first few days - you may need help later on. Bills incurred if the weeks before your chapter assumes financial responsibility cannot be paid months afterward, but the chapter will step in at whatever time you really need help. Have a

frank, friendly talk with your chapter representative at the beginning.

8. Chapters pay for hospitalization, professional services including nursing and physical therapy, transportation to and from hospitals, convalescent centers and clinics, treatment after hospitalization and appliances such as wheelchairs, braces, etc., as needed. There are no hard and fast rules. Each case is decided upon individual medical and financial needs. Assistance is given regardless of age, race, creed or color. More than 110,000 polio patients were directly assisted in full or in part up to the end of 1948.

9. In addition, your chapter can put you in touch with proper sources for nursing and physical therapy at home, can refer you to rehabilitation and vocational training agencies, will provide literature designed to give better understanding of infantile paralysis - to you will know what to expect and how to help your polio patient back to a useful life.

These services are made possible by the March of Dimes each January.

## Boy, 6, Hurt On Coffee Can

George Green, 6, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wendell Green of Drake Road, was seriously injured Thursday when he cut his foot on a sand pail fashioned from an old coffee can.

A general anesthetic and several stitches were required to close the wound and repair a severed artery. The accident occurred when George jumped into the family wading pool, in the backyard of the Green home. The boy's foot struck the upturned can, twisted off the beaded rim and exposed the sharper edge of the bare metal to the boy's foot.

The boy was rushed to St. Joseph's Hospital in Northville, where surgery was performed to tie off the artery and close the wound. The foot will be in a cast for four to six weeks. Because of the injury, the boy will be absent from the first term of school.

much of the year. Almost everything has to be carried in particularly during wet weather. Several members of the group stated that they had to carry sick persons out of the area in order to get them to a hospital.

They stated that they had appeared before the County Road Commission but were told that the roads must first be brought up to specifications before they would maintain them. The Township Board stated that they would look over the problem and get an estimate of expenses for the repair of the roads and the necessary ditching. It was mentioned that there are a number of similar emergency road problems in the Township and that some provisions should be made to correct all of them. Although the Board stated that they could make no promise, they would investigate the problem if some arrangement could be worked out.
