Conducted by the department of agricultural engineering in cooperation with the department of civil engineering, the course stresses the practical side of farm building.

The training course consists of two terms of college resident instruction and two terms of employment for experience. Each term is three months long. Courses are planned to bring the latest information to the students and the employment helps to give them training in the job.
