French Scouts Follow Fr. Marquette's Trail

If Father Marquette surprised the Indians in 1673 when he paddled along Green Bay shores, four French Rover Scouts really had Wells state park visitors wide-eyed when their two canoes bearing the flag of France hit the beach.

Greeted by conservation department park manager Shuman Worrell were Jean Raspaill of Paris, Philippe Anriou of Chantilly, Jacques Bouchard of Etampes and Yves Korbenard of Evreux. The four scouts, all over 21 years old, utilized the park as a week and resting spot on their 4,500-mile canoe trip which follows the route taken by Father Marquette and Louis Joliet in their 17th century exploration of the middle west. The scouts are taking photographs to show their friends when they return to France.

Arriving in New York last May, the 20th century explorers started their voyage at Three Rivers, Quebec, paddled over the Ottawa and St. Lawrence rivers, Lake Nipissing, French river to Georgian Bay and then onward to Sault Ste. Marie. The four have since continued to St. Ignace, entered Lake Michigan, and finally hit the shores of Wells state park on Green Bay. Raspaill says the group will fol-

low the Fox, Wisconsin and Mississippi rivers and plan to end their trip in New Orleans in November.
