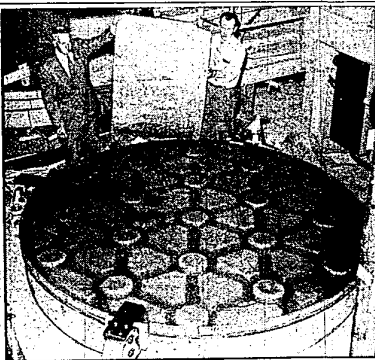

TEN EXTRA DAYS IN WATERFOWL HUNTING SEASON

Additional days of shooting for Michigan duck hunters are granted in migratory waterfowl hunting regulations for 1949. A total of 10 days of shooting will be allowed. Open season for ducks, geese and brant (except Ross' geese), coot, snort rail, other rails and gallinules is October 7 to November 15, inclusive. Open season on woodcock in the upper peninsula is October 1 to 20; in the lower peninsula October 15 to November 5. Seasons, except for woodcock, opened last year on October 15 and closed November 13. Woodcock seasons are the same this year as last, except that lower peninsula hunters get two additional days through November 5.

Michigan conservation commission recommendations concerning 1949 seasons adopted at its July meetings are incorporated in the regulations approved by President Truman. In the case of rails and gallinules, federal regulations extended to October 7 to November 15 from the October 30 recommendation.

Fish and Wildlife Service, "The improved conditions of waterfowl, as revealed by the winter inventory and the reasonably favorable situation on 1949 seasons adopted at its July meetings are incorporated in the regulations approved by President Truman. Crops and Soils

The outlook for fertilizer supplies for 1950 is brighter, Fred Gettel, assistant agricultural agent for Oakland County learned this week from officials at Michigan State College. He warned farmers, however, that they should purchase fertilizers to be needed next spring and take delivery whenever it can be made.

Nitrogen production is expected to be up about 25 per cent. Potash materials may increase from 10 to 12 per cent and phosphate materials for fertilizer are about 15 per cent greater. Gettel reports that, although production facilities have been increased, the fertilizer industry faces a big problem of keeping plants going during the fall and winter because of a lack of storage.

HOUSEWIVES CAN DEMAND LABELS ON MERCHANDISE

Homemakers who complain about the lack of labels on yard goods or ready-to-wear garments will accomplish more by directing their complaints in the right place. Labels about shrinkage, color fastness, wearing qualities and kind of fiber are expensive to the manufacturer and require a great deal of laboratory testing. Only through complaints made directly to them will the manufacturers know what the housewife wants in the way of information about her purchases and label them accordingly.

Home economists at Michigan State College say that the housewife is interested in fiber content, color fastness, shrinkage, wearing qualities, special finishes, care, and grade name. The same information she wants for draperies would not apply to a house dress.

A label about color fastness will refer to laundering and dye cleaning. If launderable, the label should state whether color fast to hand or color fast to launder, water temperature and mild or strong soap. If fast color, it should be fast to sunlight.

General terms as "pre-shrunk" or "shrinkproof" are not a guarantee against further shrinkage. Any shrinking process should give a guarantee no further shrinkage of more than two per cent. More shrinkage would mean the garment size. Thread count is an indication of wearing quality.

Labels should indicate whether finish is permanent, if permanent to dry cleaning only, or washing only, or use of fabric conditioner. It is important for the homemaker to know who guarantees the garment or fabric. If satisfied she can repeat her purchase, if not, she knows to whom to direct her complaint.
