The party embarked from Quebec July 5 on the Dutch Liner "The Lintar". The ship docked at Rotterdam, and from here the tour proceeded through Holland, Belgium, France, England, Switzerland and Italy.

While in Italy the group had an audience with Pope Pius XII at his summer villa outside Rome, attended the opera at the Baths of Caracalla, and enjoyed a swim in the Mediterranean Sea.

London, Stratford-on-Avon, and Oxford University were visited during their stay in England. The Board of Assessors reported that they have prepared and filed with the Township Clerk Special Assessment Roll No. 1, for the purpose of constructing a water system in the Woodbine Subdivision.

Commenced at the intersection of Ten Mile Road and Woodbine Drive, adjacent to Lots 1 and 2 of said Subdivision, thence running northerly, westerly and southerly said Woodbine Drive to the intersection of said Woodbine Drive with Wildwood Trail, adjacent to Lot 73 of said Subdivision, thence northerly, easterly and southerly the northerly line extended to Lot 96 of said subdivision; and
