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144 Votes Cast At Clarenceville Special Election

Voters Approve Fund Transfer

Only 144 voters in the Clarenceville School District went to the polls Monday in the Special School District Election and approved by a vote of 91 to 49 the use of surplus money in the Building and Site Fund.

There are approximately 1400 registered voters in the Clarenceville School District. According to the election board, four votes were reported spoiled.

The approval by the people gives the Board of Education authority to use funds now in the Building and Site fund for the new boiler for the Central School as well as other buildings in the Clarenceville School District.

A special meeting of the Board was held prior to the election regarding insurance coverage on the various school properties. Two separate companies have been requested to make surveys of the buildings in the Clarenceville School District for re-evaluation and coverage.

The new boiler has been installed in the Central School on Eight Mile Road and is now in operation. The boiler was installed during the early part of September, holding up the opening of the school for a week.
