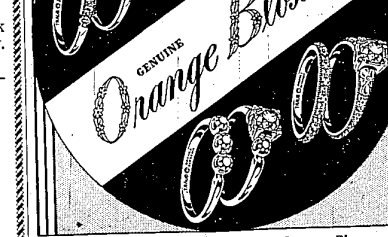

Yanke ended the third quarter. At this point Rochester had picked up nine first downs, Farmington had four.

In the opening minutes of the final quarter, Montross, Rochester fullback, broke loose again, running forty yards for a touchdown. Montross' kick was good, sending Rochester ahead 13 to 6.

Bates ran Montross' kick to the thirty-five yard line. Broog of Rochester intercepted a pass by Barrons and was hit on the 46 by Tyler. Allyson of Rochester tucked the ball under his arm and headed for the Farmington goal.

Allyson was tackled by Rochester's defense. Co-captains Barrons and Boyce elected to take the penalty. Rochester conceded 15 yards. Farmington was forced to punt.

A five yard penalty against Rochester for being offside; a center over the head of Montross; who lost 15 yards on the play; and 5 tumbled on the Rochester 23 yard line.

## Need Care In Corn Harvest

Mechanical corn pickers are at work harvesting another big crop. They can do it in record time if they are operated safely. Michigan State College agricultural engineers suggest these safety pointers:

Stop the picker to make adjustments. Keep guards in place — manufacturers provide shields for exposed parts. Watch out for fires — remove trash accumulations before the picker begins cutting or making any adjustments.
