MSC Registers New
Enrollment Record

Enrollment at Michigan State College reached a new time high of 16,651 students at the end of fall term registrations October 3.

Another 150 short course students are expected to sign up for classes October 20, bringing the final fall enrollment to approximately 16,800, according to Registrar Robert S. Linton.

This 16,651 figure exceeds by 165 the 16,486 students recorded at the same time last year, Linton said. The final enrollment in 1948, including short course students, was 16,010.

Veterans are in a minority for the first time since the war, a break-down of figures revealed. Ex-servicemen constitute approximately 43 per cent of the campus total.

Seating the guests were Milton Heywood and James Ryan. Mr. and Mrs. Osmus are living in Lansing, where Martin is a senior at Michigan State College.

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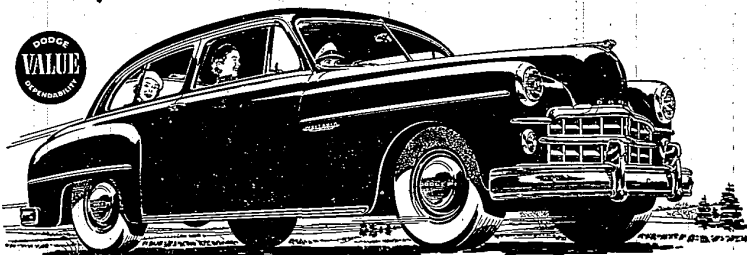


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
