**FORRY DWELLING FIRES EACH DAY TAKE HEAVY TOLL**

Protect your home against fire! This is the urgent advice of State Police Commissioner Donald S. Leonard, who points out that last year an average of more than 40 dwelling fires occurred in Michigan each day.

Leonard, who is also state fire marshal, made his comment in connection with the observance of fire prevention week last week.

"Last year 164 persons lost their lives in fires in Michigan, and most of the victims were children," Leonard said.

"The total fire loss of \$29 million in the state in 1948 represented a sum sufficient to build a 100-room hospital each month for an entire year. The loss in dwelling fires alone amounted to \$7 million."

"An average of three persons are burned to death each week in Michigan. Most of these fatal fires occur in homes and are the result of carelessness and oversight."

"Now is the time to check all heating equipment and make necessary repairs, clean up rubbish, put combustible materials in a safe place, and check all possible fire hazards."

"Most fires can be avoided by precautionary measures."

**Bear Tries To Stop Show**

A Chippewa county bear did not stop the show in the township hall in the village of Strong. It never got started until Conservation Officer Edward Dorie finally shot the animal.

Getting a hurried call from an irate moviegoer, Dorie arrived on the scene to find a bear parked at the hall entrance defying evening film patrons: to get out of their cars.

**Military Courses Popular At MSC**

Michigan State College's ROTC unit established another enrollment record this fall when a total of 242 students signed up for military courses, according to public information officer John N. Johns. This compares with last year's 234.

Another interesting note was that the number of students seeking reserve and regular commissions in a full four-year program increased 20 per cent.

**Guidance Parley Slated For MSC**

Guidance experts concerned with the direction of youths toward futures for which they are most fitted will gather at MSC for the third annual State Conference for Counselors November 2.

Sponsored jointly by the MSC Institute of Counseling, Testing and Guidance and the Michigan Counselors Association, the conference will study the role of the counselor, techniques, follow-up procedures and reports.

Main lines of the conference will concern prospects of improving personal relations through counseling, aid to students planning for college, assistance to non-college students, and placement services.

Outstanding speakers on the day-long program will include Lee M. Thurston, state superintendent of public instruction; Russell E. Doney, chairman of the board, Michigan Counselors Association; and Floyd Cromwell, director of guidance services, Maryland state Department of Education.

**More Hunters Get Ducks**

More hunters, more local ducks and a larger kill in spite of "butterfly" weather is the way the conservation department describes the opening days of the duck season this year.

In the Pie Moultrie marshes of Lake Erie, one location where the department has a positive check of waterfowl hunters, 522 ducks were taken the first day, 114 the second and 104 the third day. If a bag of 155 coots are included in the three day tally, 905 ducks or about one duck per hunter was the average. The Pie Moultrie area drew the maximum of 300 hunters permitted daily. A number of hunters were turned away on opening day.

Preliminary reports from conservation department checkers indicate more hunters were out and shot more ducks than last year in other key areas such as the St. Clair Flats, east side of Saginaw Bay and the Tawas area on Lake Huron. Below average kill on the west side of Saginaw Bay was attributed to "sky" shooters. A larger hunting army did almost as well in two inland locations checked, Kalamazoo river marshes and the Dead stream marshes in Roscommon county.

Conservation department observers also were in agreement that sharp-tail grouse hunters on Drummond Island, although fewer in number, were more successful on this year's opening week end. A conservation department check showed 149 hunters shot 125 sharp-tails. The Bullock ranch area, Schoolcraft county, attracted 223 hunters who bagged 163 sharp-tails, 50 ruffed grouse and six prairie chickens.
