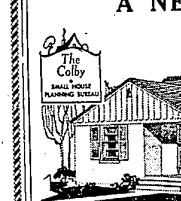

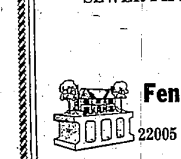

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Septic Tanks

use and would not touch any present uses of land.

Colston told The Enterprise that requiring subdividers to install sanitary sewers before selling property would prevent improper septic tank action, but would be difficult to do. He stated real estate operators would find such requirements expensive and the requirements would discourage future developments.

Zoning, he maintained, would prevent attempts to put septic fields into too-small areas. He also pointed out that the Farmington Township Sanitary Code requires a 100 foot minimum drain field, whereas State regulations specify a minimum of 125 feet, with a 500 gallon septic tank. "And these requirements," he added, "are based on ideal conditions of loose, sandy loam, not the hard ground in this area."

Other preventive measures are made by the Federal Housing Authority before accepting real estate projects for mortgages, Colston said. The FHA specifies the project must meet with local sanitation approval before being accepted. This has had little effect, Colston claimed, because operators find it easy to subdivide parcels into smaller lots and obtain private mortgages for the customers.

"Trailer parks have a better sanitation rating than many homes in this area, Colston stated. Before a trailer camp is approved for a state permit, required by law, its water and sewage facilities must be inspected and found acceptable.

"This law is unfair, Colston said. "A fellow who wants to start a trailer camp has to go through the expense of putting it in good order, but anyone can set up cheap cabins as tourist camps without having to even build inside toilets."

When asked about possible connections between overflowing septic tanks and polio, Colston answered that there is a known connection between water, sewage and polio virus. However, there is no positive knowledge that flies carry the virus. In the area he was called to inspect, Colston ordered the number of people at and residence reduced, and the size of the septic tank field increased.

"That's the problem," he said. "We can't go around counseling houses and advising people — this isn't Russia. But that doesn't change the fact that the ground won't absorb the sewage from so many homes so close together. We just have to wait until the people demand sewers and are willing and ready to pay for them."

"But until then, all we can do is cross our fingers."

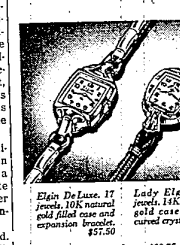

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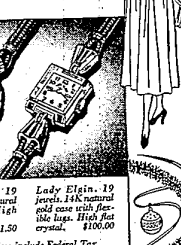
