Mrs. Edgar Reed, on Grand River, flew to Washington, D. C., to visit her son and daughter-in-law.



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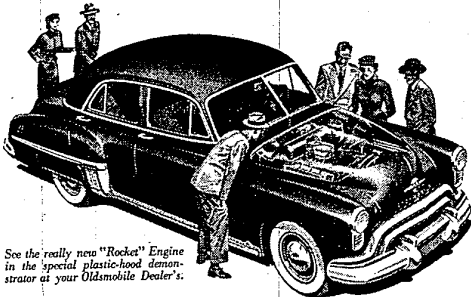
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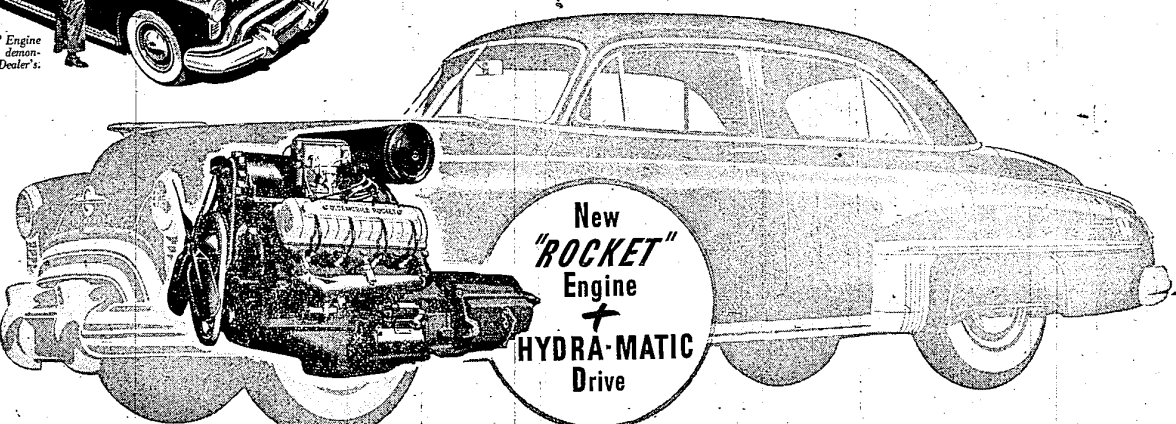
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
