Business Is MSC's Most Popular Course

America's vast business activity — on both sides of the counter — found expression at Michigan State College this fall as student enrollment made the Department of Business Administration the most popular in the college.

Enrollment in classes ranging from insurance contracts to advanced accounting stood at 2,125, according to Registrar Robert S. Linton. Engineering ranked second with 1,593 students, followed by general agriculture with 1,027, social science 925, education 749, and language and literature 728.

This is in line with the records of the past several years, which showed these six courses in greater demand than those of other specialized departments.

Prof. Edward A. Gee, head of the department of business administration, attributed the popularity of the department to the fact that "business is as wide as the world." Consumers as well as businessmen are being trained in business courses, Prof. Gee said.

Total fall enrollment figures at Michigan State show that all but one Michigan county are represented in the student body. Wayne county leads in numbers with 2,759 and Ingham county is second with 2,159.

In the total student body of 16,243, 45 states and the District of Columbia are represented. Forty-seven foreign countries and U. S. Possessions have sent 300 students to the college.

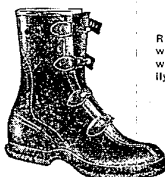

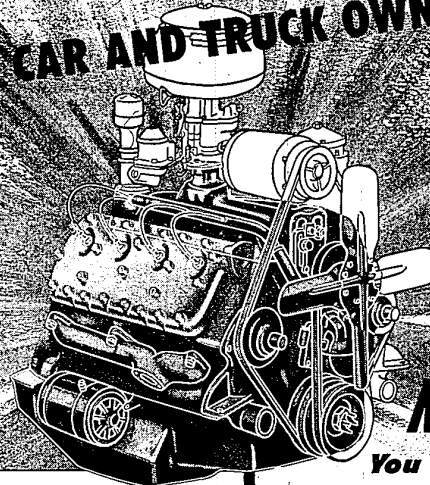
