The Clarenceville High School will begin its 1949-1950 schedule Friday night at Northville with the tip-off time slated for 7 p.m. The Trojans will engage the Mustangs in the season's first game for both squads. The game had previously been scheduled for the Clarenceville gymnasium, but due to the lack of stationary backboards the game was moved to the Mustang's home floor.

During the past week Coach Charles Craig has been shaping up his squad. He plans to carry ten men on his varsity squad, possibly 12.

Most of the members of the Reserve squad are first year men, with no previous basketball experience.

The Trojans felt, for the first time last week, a taste of actual combat, as they held a scrimmage session with Bentley High School. The two teams had the ball for periods of about eight minutes each, working entirely on offense for eight minutes, and then on defense for eight minutes.

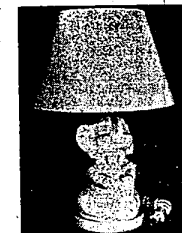
