## Trojans Lose To Northville, 48 - 25

The Clarenceville Trojans dropped their opening basketball game last Friday night to Northville by the score of 48 to 25. Coach Charles Greig started Hank Albers and Roy Nelson at forwards, Don Rutta and Bob Layland at guards, and big Bob Godette at center.

The opening period saw the Trojans scoring four points while Northville broke loose for 15, getting most of them on fast breaks.

The second period proved much more fruitful for Clarenceville. Bob Godette and Don Rutta each hit for two field goals to lead the way as the Trojans ran up 11 points. Northville continued their attack also with fair success and the half ended with the Trojans trailing by seven points, 22-15.

The third quarter was all Northville as the Mustangs poured in seven field goals for 14 points while holding Clarenceville scoreless. The score stood 36 to 15 and the fourth quarter showed the Mustangs continue to increase their margin. The final show on the scoreboard read 48 to 25 with Northville victorious.

Big Bob Godette, Trojan's 6 ft. 5 inch pivot man, took scoring honors with ten points on four field goals and two free throws. Don Rutta scored six points, Roy Nelson four points, Bob Layland and Hank Albers each two and Marvin Kohnman one to round out the Trojan's score.

Clarenceville's next game is away and will be played tomorrow night against Fitzgerald High School.
