### Blue Star Mothers Not On "Red" List

The Farmington chapter of the Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc. now has documentary proof that it is not a part of the Communist underground. In April of this year, the Attorney General's office included on a list of "subversive" organizations the name of the "National Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc." A letter received from the Attorney General's office clears the similarity between the black-listed unit and the local organization. It reads:

"The designation of the National Blue Star Mothers of America whose headquarters are at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, does not, of course, refer in any way to your organization, the Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc. whose headquarters are at Smiths Creek, Michigan. It is unfortunate that the similarity of names of the two organizations has caused embarrassment and confusion to your group."

### Pork Not Well Done Dangerous To Health

All pork — regardless of the cut — should be cooked to the well-done stage because of the danger of harmful parasites in pork that is not cooked well.

A small percentage of hogs contain the parasite which causes trichinosis in persons eating the uncooked pork. Through cooking makes these parasites harmless — just as pasteurization kills harmful bacteria in milk.

In check the cooking time of the various pork cuts carefully, suggest home economists at Michigan State College. One-half hour of cooking time per pound of pork is a good allowance for hams and other large cuts of pork.

To check for doneness, make a small incision next to the bone and also in the thicker part of the meat. Fresh pork cooked to the well-done stage is grayish in color — not pink.

If you are using a thermometer for checking time and temperature, follow the directions to the letter. The page will indicate the temperature to which pork should be cooked.
