**GROUSE HUNTERS CHALK UP BEST SEASON**

A larger army of ruffed grouse hunters chalked up the best season on record with an estimated kill of over 400,000 birds, judging from reports of hunters contacted by conservation department field men.

The department's game division first started checking hunter success in 1937.

Presession expectations were that the take would exceed the 354,000 bagged by 55,000 hunters last year and might go over the 1945 record kill of 350,000. In the below average 1947 season, hunters shot 229,000 ruffed grouse.

Past season's final figures are based in analysis of report cards turned in by hunters. In order to make the 1948 final season estimate as accurate as possible, the department's game division reminds hunters to mail in their cards whether they were successful or not.

Most hunters, this season, told district game managers and conservation officers they saw more birds to shoot at, and would welcome an extension of the season next year in view of the bird supply, especially in the upper peninsula. Under existing statute, 30 days is the maximum the conservation department is permitted to open in the upper peninsula, 22 in the lower peninsula.

Hunter success was attributed not only to increase in the grouse population, but also to favorable hunting conditions. Unlike duck hunters this year, ruffed grouse seekers had nearly ideal weather which was neither too dry nor too wet. Country roads were passable and trees shed their leaves early.

Lower peninsula hunting season was greatest opening day and week ends. Few hunters were out in the upper peninsula after the first week. Total number of hunters in the field is believed to be over 93,000 last year. First stamping of hunting license sales show 62 per cent more purchased through October 31 as compared with the same period last year.

Preliminary reports also indicate a slight increase in the take of bluebirds, but not as great as originally anticipated.
