## Trojans Drop Two In Week

Clarencville's Trojans dropped two basketball games last week, to South Lyon 24-23, and to Madison High, 40-35.

The Clarencville-South Lyon game proved to be a defensive contest. The score at half time stood 11 to 10. Clarencville leading. Albers, Godette and Nelson contributed two, five and four points respectively for the Trojans in the first half.

In the closing minutes the Trojans staged a strong attempt to overcome a three point deficit. Riggs and Godette dropped in free throws to cut the lead to one point, but South Lyon held out and the Trojans lost 24-23.

The Madison game was the direct opposite of the South Lyon game. Both teams scored freely with Madison coming out on the long end of a 40 to 35 score, after Clarencville had held the lead for three periods.

Utilizing a zone defense, the Trojans held the Madison five well in check during the first two periods. At half time the Trojans held a five point advantage, 21-16.

Big Bob Godette pumped in eight points. Riggs five, Albers four, Nelson and Rutla each two to total the Clarencville 21 points.

Madison came back strong after the half but the Trojans continued to hold the lead, leading at the close of the third period 27 to 24.

From this point on, the game was nip and tuck. It was finally decided by Madison's center, Swice, who dropped in two buckets in the last 45 seconds of play. The score had stood 35-35 with but a minute to play.

Albers, Godette and Riggs shared top honors, each getting ten points.

Clarencville's Junior Varsity split their two games with the Junior Varsity of South Lyon and Madison.

Against South Lyon the Junior Varsity overcame a 15-9 deficit at the half and went on to win 27-17, limiting South Lyon to just two free throws in the second half. Jack Cowart led the scoring with six points, closely followed by Joe Whyte, Jack Falter and Russell Robitaille, who each had four points.

Against Madison the Reserves were beaten 43-16, but Jack Falter, Trojan Junior Varsity center, proved a shining light in their defeat as he dropped in eight points.

Keego Harbor will be the Trojans' next foe. This game will be played in the Clarencville gymnasium on January 10. B. R.
