SOUTHEAST CIVIC ASSOCIATION AIDS NEEDY FAMILIES

The Southeast Farmington Township Civic Association completed plans Tuesday night to aid more than 20 families within the township, spokesmen for the group announced.

A special committee composed of Mrs. D. H. Ward, Mrs. Floyd Sunrill, Mrs. Leon Robinson, Mrs. Vern Hawley and Mrs. T. J. Thornton spent Monday and Tuesday contacting businesses in the Association's area to collect groceries for the organization's effort.

Russell Wauke, of the C. F. Smith Store on Eight Mile at Grand River, Shepard's Market on Grand River, and Amer's Market pledged contributions and cut grocery prices for the group.

After consultation with Farmington Goodfellows to avoid omission and duplication, the Association will attempt to aid more than 20 families in the township. Exact number to be aided was not immediately determined.

Plans for the Christmas aid were clarified and committees appointed Sunday when the Association was the guest of a buffet luncheon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Thornton, Eldred Avenue. More than 40 people attended the meeting, held in the recreation room of the new Thornton home.

Guests included all but one member of the Township Board, as well as officers of the Association and their friends. An elaborate buffet was prepared by Mr. and Mrs. Thornton, their son Douglas, and son-in-law and daughter.

C. F. Westlake, president of the organization, pledged to "continue improvement of Farmington Township as a residential area."

LEGION SEARCHES FOR NAMES OF WAR DEAD

The Groves-Walker Post of the American Legion, in preparing to dedicate a memorial plaque to local men and women who lost their lives in World Wars, are seeking to complete the list of men and women eligible for inclusion on the plaque.

Veterans whose names are to appear on the plaque must have lived within the Farmington Post Office area, and lost their lives while in the armed services between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, for World War I, and December 7, 1941 to September 2, 1945, for World War II.
