Falcon Freshmen Whip Trojan Reserves 31 - 22

The Clarenceville Varsity didn't see any action last week but the Reserve squad engaged the Farmington Freshmen and lost to the Falcons, 31 to 22.

The Falcon Freshmen jumped into a 10 to 2 lead at the end of the first quarter, but the Trojans came back strong in the second period and scored 11 points to 4 for Farmington. Jack Falor scored five and Joe Whyte four, to lead the Trojans back into contending position for the lead. Even though the Trojans outscored Farmington, the Falcons led 17 to 13 at half time.

The third period saw the Falcons clinch the game as Doyle Nichols and Larry Pink each scored two to boost the Farmington score to 24 points as the quarter ended. The Falcon defense had limited the Trojans to but four points, the score standing at 24 to 17, Farmington leading.

The final period was nearly an exact repetition of the third with Farmington counting seven points and the Trojans five. The game ended 31 to 22 with the Farmington Freshmen victorious. Doyle Nichols led the winners with ten points but Jack Falor, Trojan center, took top scoring honors for both teams as he dropped in 11 points on four baskets and three free throws.

Clarenceville's Annex Nears Completion

The shower and locker rooms in the new annex at C.H.S. are nearing completion. Walls of the shower rooms have already been treated with a waterproofing material, and shower spouts have been installed.

The modern basketball backboards have been shipped in and are ready to be installed along with the electric scoreboard. The backboards are fan-shaped and made of heavy gauge sheet metal. Basket racks have been made and are ready to be installed in the locker rooms. The boys' locker room will have eight racks of 12 basket spaces each. These will be installed in rows along the south wall of the room. The girls' locker rooms will be equipped with an undecided number of similar racks.

Workmen have sealed all concrete floors in the annex with Hibbard's Onex Seal, a waxy compound which is rubbed in to fill the small pores in the cement. This eliminates efflorescence and prevents small dirt particles from staying on the floor.

Debaters Finish Season With Romulus Loss

The Clarenceville debate team concluded its season last Friday as it dropped both the negative and affirmative contests to Romulus High School.

These two losses left Clarenceville's negative team, composed of Audrey Kennard and Jane Rutilla, with a record of three wins and one loss. The affirmative team, which was made up of Doug Gault and Jean Cashman, finished the season with one win and three losses.

Encouraging is the fact that all four team members will be back next year. The Negative team debated a Romulus affirmative team which had, as one member, a boy who finished second in state competition last year.

A plaque is awarded to all schools whose teams win six of eight debates, counting both the record of the affirmative and the negative squads.
