plan to work in teams with one man driving and one taking notes.

The board also discussed the general plans for the proposed code. Chairman Edward Mosseman stated the code would have to be a short one—shorter than those for near-by townships and a great deal shorter than the last Zoning Code proposed for Farmington Township.

"I voted against that last code," Mosseman said, "because there was too much of it for me to digest before voting time. We're going to have a short, simple, and broad general code when we get through here, and everybody's going to have ample opportunity to think it over and comment on it."

Special dedication services of the classroom-gymnasium addition at the Clarenceville High School will be held Tuesday evening, February 7, Louis Schmidt, superintendent of schools, announced this week.

C. E. Forsythe, assistant superintendent for Inter-Scholastic Athletics, State Department of Public Instruction, will be the guest speaker. The balance of the program is now being developed and will be announced next week.

A lot of you people have the idea that this is an exclusive joint. Taint so! We're just plain folks but we're tryin' to offer yuh things yuh can't git other places. Fer instance where else can you git home rendered lard or hickory smoked bacon in a slab? We got 'em and you can git 'em here. The lard is 2 lbs. for 35c and the bacon is 59c a lb. And say—howdcha like some rolls that taste jest like the kind Maw used to make? We got them too and we're sorry as heck if you came in Saturday and they were all gone. We can't seem to git enuf of 'em. Course we're talkin' about Grennans Brown and Serve rolls. Jest ask anybody that's had 'em and they'll tell yuh they're swell. If you aint got much fer dinner they're a swell filler in-er. We could fix yuh a good meal quick like and cheap too. Use them thar rolls and have cottage cheese (19c a lb) and apricot (25c a can) salad and a dish of Kraft dinner (2 pkgs. for 25c). Good, huh? Sumthin' else we got kinda exclusive is fresh eggs. Boy, we're lucky! We got connections. Betcha you can't find a bad one in the lot of 'em. They're even graded. The large ones are 49c a dozen and the medium ones are 43c. They'd taste good with some of our hickory smoked bacon—wouldn't they?

Betcha yuh never thought about this—but when you buy frozen foods from us—they've stayed frozen. They aint ever been thawed out and frozen agin cause we got a place to keep 'em cold. They aint frozen and thawed out and sold fer fresh either—like maybe perch filets. They're only 33c a lb. and they're frozen. We got some strawberries, too. It's getting long about the time of year when yuh git an itchin' fer that kind of stuff. Well you can have a box of berries all sweetened fer 39c. It's a full lb. package too, not jest 12 oz. We also got some frozen pineapple tidbits what taste jest like fresh pineapple that you can git a cuppla packages of fer 29c.

Our beautiful blonde butchers have some boneless rolled veal roasts for only 49c a lb. And Mr. Mickleberry has come thru with some hot dogs what we can sell fer 39c a lb. Remember way back when we used to call hot dogs weiners? Then if you don't want hickory smoked bacon they've got some already packaged and sliced fer 35c a lb. If you drop around this week end and our joint stinks—it aint business that smells—we're gonna paint the joint and clean it up.
