## New Members See How S. C. Clicks At Meeting

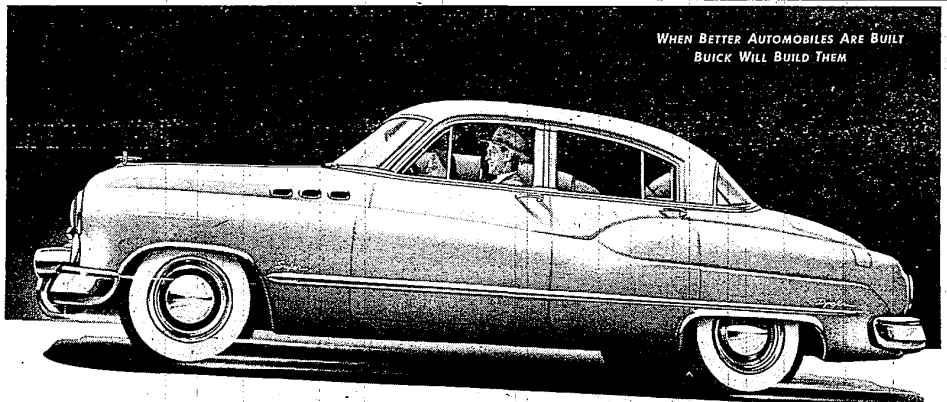
